What your child been taught so far

Your child has been taught most of Phase 5, they know:

- new graphemes for the Phase 2 and 3 sounds
- that the same grapheme can have alternative pronunciations.

The 'Grow the code' lessons support children with reading and spelling these alternative spellings.



How we teach Phase 5



Reading words

Children will be able to:

- blend independently
- blend in their heads with increasing fluency and confidence
- start to distinguish between different phonemes/graphemes.





Phonics Screening Check

This term we are preparing for the Phonics Screening Check



What is the Phonics Screening Check?

- It is a quick check of your child's phonics knowledge.
- It is **not** designed to create any stress or anxiety for your child.
- It assesses decoding skills using phonics.
- It consists of 40 words (20 real words, 20 'alien words').

If children do not achieve the required score in Year 1, they will retake the screening at the end of Year 2.



How does the check work?

- Your child will sit with a member of staff that they know.
- They will be asked to read 40 words aloud.
- This takes just a few minutes to complete, but there is no time limit.
- If your child is struggling, the teacher will stop.
- It has been carefully designed not to be stressful for your child.

A quick guide to alien words

'Alien words' recap



- The check will contain 20 'alien words'.
- The children will be familiar with alien words and will start to read them this term.
- Alien words assess children's decoding skills and are used in lessons for the purpose of preparing for the Phonics Screening Check **only**.
- Children cannot read these words by using their memory or known vocabulary, so they have to use their decoding skills. This is a fair way to assess their ability to decode.
- The Phonics Screening Check will be administered in June.

What sort of words will children read?



• The test starts off with simpler words to build confidence and gets gradually more challenging.

Fluency

What is fluency?



The ability to apply and identify the correct pronunciation of written words immediately and without conscious effort. It involves smoothly and effortlessly decoding words while also comprehending and interpreting the text.



What is fluency?

(Reading words correctly)

Accuracy

- Includes accurate decoding and word recognition
- Enables automaticity and prosody to develop

Automaticity

(Reading words automatically)

- - Requires reading accuracy
 - Enables an appropriate reading speed
 - Feels effortless

Prosody

(Reading with appropriate stress and intonation)

- Requires reading accuracy
 and comprehension
- Leads to variation in volume, phrasing, smoothness and pace
- Sounds interesting and engaged





Around 90 words per minute is a good indicator of when pupils 'start to read with sufficient fluency to focus on their understanding.

Children should be reading 60-70 words per minute by the end of Year 1.

Children need to read texts with sufficient speed and accuracy to make meaning from words and absorb what they are reading.

How can I support my child to become a more fluent reader?



- Children are given reading books that they are able to read and should not be too challenging for them.
- They will have read the book in school 3 times before bringing it home, so they should already be reading the book fairly easily.
- If you notice there are some sounds or words they are finding tricky, use the page at the front of the book to remind them of these before starting to read the whole book.
- Encourage children to 'blend in your head' and only decode words aloud if they are particularly finding the word tricky.
- Encourage children to take note of punctuation marks and use expression in their reading- you can model this at home.
- Do not let children just guess at words- speed is important but accuracy is also vital. If they are struggling ask them to identify digraphs and decode out loud. If they still cannot read the word, read it to them.
- Listen to them read often and let them read the whole book through without stopping to ask questions as often as you can.
- Read to your child- there is nothing better that a super role model to help your child to become a fluent reader!
