Dear Parents,

At Birches, we always strive to create an exciting and passionate reading community.

We understand that reading feeds children's imagination and unlocks the joy and wonder for curious young minds. We want to confidently ensure that each and every child in our school is given the tools to become an enthusiastic and confident reader.

Reading for pleasure is our goal for all of our children; we want to instil a love of reading and an appreciation of books. Reading for pleasure can:

- Improve children's vocabulary, spelling and maths and access to the wider curriculum/world around us.
- Positively impact children's attainment.
- Increase empathy, improve relationships and improve wellbeing.

As some of you are aware from the previous years, teachers have worked hard to create a "Reading Across the Curriculum" page for your child's year group. This proved popular and will be completed again each term for this academic year.

This is a list of **suggested books** (fiction, non-fiction and poetry) for you to access at home with your child (particularly if they really enjoyed learning about a specific topic) to support them with their interests, should you wish to do so. It includes books linked to History, Geography, Computing, Science, PSHE.

Please note that this **is only a recommended book list** that links to the various subjects across the curriculum for your child and is not an expectation. It is aimed to be used if you can see your child is showing a particular fascination in one of the units taught at school. We would suggest contacting libraries to see if they have the book and if you can request to loan the book from another library.

Teachers have also included a wordless picture book to promote discussion and a love of reading at home. Picture books without words develop a child's ability to infer what is happening in the story. With no words for guidance, they have to consider using the illustrations and their imagination. This develops comprehension and an overall understanding of story structure and plot.

Finally, there is a poetry book to expose children to a range of different genres and texts. Reading poetry helps children to learn key knowledge and skills about voice, pitch, volume, and inflection. While these are mainly functions of speech, they're also incredibly important for children learning to read.

We would LOVE to know if you access any of our recommended texts, if you do, please upload this information onto Boom Reader to inform our teachers. We are always eager to reward reading gems to children on the app for their efforts and enthusiasm!

Teachers and I monitor the access and use of Boom Reader daily, the comments provided at home allow staff an insight into your thoughts and views and indeed help staff with your child's learning journey. Please note that even if it is one page that your child is reading at home daily we would greatly appreciate a comment written on Boom Reader so we can better gauge their understanding and comprehension of the book(s) they are reading.
