What affects where people live?

Human features are things that people have made, like building or roads. They weren't there before humans came along.

Physical features are natural things that were already in the place, such as trees or rivers.

How are cities and villages different to live in?

Village: Few hundred to few thousand people. Often in countryside. More green space, wildlife, less busy.

Town: Few thousand to tens of thousands of people. Sometimes has a train station and a hospital.

City: Hundred of thousands or millions of people. An advanced transport system.
